
Administrators' Message

Advent before Christmas—A Reflection

A lot of people are unaware that the Church's liturgical year begins with the First Sunday of Advent. Unfortunately, in western culture, we have come to see these four weeks prior to the great Christian feast of Christmas, as a time for putting out the nativity scene, putting up a tree and decorating the house with lights, as well as a time for intense shopping and partying. We put on the Christmas music and hum to it while we are engaged in activities that make the home environment festive. Often times, the time of Advent is overshadowed by a hastening of Christmas. This is seen clearly in our malls and shopping centers where signs of Christmas have been evident since before Remembrance Day in November.

Christmas is a beautiful feast on the Christian calendar, but to deny the season of Advent its place in the liturgical year removes much of the meaning of Christmas. During Advent, we are invited to silent reflection on what the Incarnation of Christ opens us to. We focus on God's promise as articulated by the Prophets of old, who foretold of the hope, peace, and joy that would be birthed for the salvation of all. The lighting of the Advent candles and the use of other symbols in our liturgies and classrooms, are meant to remind us of God's desire to enter human history and instill and inspire hope in a world that does not often recognize hope or happiness.

This year, Advent begins on November 30. A good way to prepare for Christmas is to let Advent take its course; to postpone Christmas until December 24th. Our focus and practices Inspired by our Good Shepherd, Jesus, to Love, Learn and Lead.

should take us to Christmas, by remembering, recalling, rejoicing in the promise of God to send us a Savior so that all may know of God's justice, mercy, and fidelity. Prayer, silence, reflection, and giving birth to Christ on a daily basis will help us to restore the deep meaning and relevance of Christmas as a religious festival and help us to remove some of the materialism that has become associated with it. Let us travel the path of Advent toward Christmas. Let us not lose sight of God's Word made flesh in our own lives and actions.



Advent Celebrations

Throughout December, students will be marking each week of Advent with a classroom celebration. The school-wide Advent celebration celebrating the first week of Advent will take place in our school gymnasium on Friday, December 5 at 1:15 pm. Families and friends are welcome to join us!

Our School Charism: "Inspired by our Good Shepherd, Jesus, to Love, Learn and Lead."

Jesus Christ Is the Good Shepherd. In the Bible, shepherds are used to represent leaders of God's people (see Isaiah 63:11; Jeremiah 23:2). Shepherds watch for enemies who might attack the sheep, and they defend them when necessary. They tend to sick or wounded sheep and search for and rescue lost or trapped ones. In Christ's teachings, shepherds love their sheep and try to earn their trust. The sheep know, love, and trust the shepherd above all others. A good shepherd will even die for his sheep. Christ contrasts the shepherd with the hireling, who deserts the sheep in times of danger because he does not love them (see John 10:11–13).

Jesus Christ is the Good Shepherd. In John 10:14–15, Jesus explains that He and His sheep know each other, just as He and His Father know each other. This kind of relationship develops over time and requires personal experience.

A shepherd watches over sheep. In the scriptural stories the sheep are in danger; they need protection and nourishment. The Savior warns us that we must watch the sheep as He does. He gave His life for them. They are His. We cannot approach His standard if, like a hired servant, we watch only when it is convenient and only for a reward. The members of the Church are the sheep. They are His, and we are called by Him to watch over them. We are to do more than warn them against danger. We are to feed them.

These remarkable achievements reflect the hard work, dedication, and perseverance of our students; the commitment and expertise of our staff; and the ongoing support of our families. This truly is a Kindergarten–to–Grade 6 celebration of learning, growth, and partnership.

Sacramental Preparation

The first faith educator of the child is the parent, as stated in the Vatican II documents. As part of our Catholic religion curriculum, we support parents when their children are going through sacramental preparation at their local parishes. Parents are required to register their children into Sacramental Preparation courses through their Church. We celebrate with students by sharing their news on morning announcements and presenting the student with a special sacramental pin. Please have your child share this information with their classroom teacher so we do not miss anyone.

Preparation for the sacraments of Reconciliation (Penance) and Eucharist (Communion) is offered for children in Grade 2 and higher. Preparation for the sacrament of Confirmation is offered to children in Grade 6 and higher. Deadlines for registrations at each parish vary, please see your home parish registration forms for details.

December: It's Not Cool to be Cold!

Did You Know?

- Snow forts and tunnels can collapse and suffocate a child.
- When children are outside they often do not realize how cold they are becoming.
- Bright sun during the winter can cause a sunburn.

What Parents Can Do:

- Signs of frost nip are slight pain and whitening of the affected area
 e.g. tips of the ears turn white. Warm the affected area by breathing
 on it or warming it with your hands but do not rub. Do not apply snow or water.
- Supervise children when they play outside.
- Choose play areas with warm shelters nearby.
- Provide children with a neck warmer instead of a scarf to prevent strangulation on playground equipment.

What Kids Can Do:

- If you feel pain in your fingers, toes, ears, cheeks, nose or chin, get inside to warm up.
- Dress in layers. If you get too warm take off one layer at a time.
- Wear sunscreen on exposed skin on sunny days.
- Don't put your tongue on cold metal.

If you can only remember one thing: Most of our body heat is lost through our heads, so always wear a hat or toque in cold weather.

Parents may have questions regarding the issue of not being allowed to take photos and video recordings at most on-site school events. Please be aware that it is not school or Division policy that dictates this, but rather government legislation. Below are some FAQs regarding Division administrative procedures that are based on government legislation.

FAQs Regarding the Taking of Photos and Video Recordings at School Events



Why can't parents and visitors to our site take photos and video recordings while at a school event?

- The Protection of Privacy Act (POPA) is a provincial law that applies to all public bodies in Alberta. This law is designed to strike a balance between an individual's right to privacy and the public's right to know. POPA applies to the operations of the Division and, with few exceptions, to all records under the custody or control of Edmonton Catholic Schools. Alberta's Protection of Privacy Act requires the Division and its employees to:
- 1. Protect the privacy of individuals' personal information.
- 2. Provide a general right to access to the information held by the Division.

When can parents and visitors take photos and video recordings? Are schools public spaces?

- Schools and classrooms are the private property of the Division. By default, they are not public spaces. Parents and visitors may not take photos and video recordings.
- When an event is held in a public venue (at a parish, for example), it is beyond the Division or school's ability to restrict who may or may not take photographs.
- Students and members of the public can take photos or videos of students at school activities that are held at public venues which are open to the general public. These activities include, but are not limited to, sporting events, some field trips, concerts and theatrical performances. It is beyond the Division or school's ability to control the use, or further distribution, of personal information acquired in these instances.

What if an event is held at the school that is open to the public?

• At times (very seldom) a school may choose to hold a public event at the school. When this is the case, administration will declare the event a public event. An email will be sent out to the school community and signs will be placed on the front doors to notify parents and the public that the event is open to the public and pictures and video recordings are permitted. Schools will not do this very often because it opens up the site to the general public which is a safety, security and privacy concern. It may also limit students from participating in school events. When a public event is held at the school, all visitors in attendance may take pictures or recordings without first obtaining consent.

Can staff take photographs of students?

• School staff are allowed to take photographs or recordings of students for use within the school. Consent is not required in these instances as they fall under the general notification of the collection of personal information for the delivery of educational programing, which is included in the annual registration form. If schools plan on distributing or displaying these images/videos outside of the school, parental consent is required.


Grade 4 Bible Presentation: Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ





Please join us in praying for our Grade 4 students as they open their hearts to God's Word and continue to grow in faith and understanding.








5A Makes the News!


Excitement was in the air when CTV's meteorologist Josh Klassen and his camera crew, Bruce Wiggins, visited Mr. Griebel's 5A class — and our students made it on the news!

During their visit, students got a behind-the-scenes look at the fascinating world of weather prediction:

- How weather is predicted: Josh shared that meteorologists use computer modeling, historical data, satellite imaging, and First Nations, Métis, and Inuit traditional knowledge to forecast the skies.
- Where to check the weather: Students explored websites, weather maps, and apps to see how everyone can access up-to-date weather info.
- Tools of the trade: Our class got a peek at the instruments used to measure weather, including thermometers, wind vanes, windsocks, anemometers, barometers, rain/snow gauges, and hygrometers.

It was an incredible learning experience, and seeing 5A on the CTV evening news made it even more unforgettable!
