


Office Hours

Our School Charism: "Inspired by our Good Shepherd, Jesus, to Love, Learn and Lead."



Like most people today, chances are you do not know any shepherds. For the first Christians, who were familiar with shepherds, the Good Shepherd was a favorite image to associate with Christ. In fact, the earliest Christian art depicts Christ as the Good Shepherd, not the crucified Savior. Often, he was portrayed as a beardless youth. Surprisingly, the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is still popular. In fact, early childhood education experts tell us that young children find the concept of a shepherd and his love for his sheep enchanting.

According to the Gospels, Jesus referred to himself as a shepherd. He said, "My sheep hear my voice; I know

them, and they follow me" (John 10:27). A shepherd knows his sheep well. There is a personal relationship between Jesus and his followers. Jesus knows each of us by name. On the other hand, we respond to his voice and do not follow the voice of strangers who may lead us to harm. Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). Unlike a hired hand who flees to save his life, Jesus saved his flock from the wolf even though it meant sacrificing his own life.

The parable Jesus told about the lost sheep is a story about Jesus' concern and care for us sinners. He is the loving shepherd who goes to great lengths to search for his lost sheep and when he finds it, carries it back on his shoulders rejoicing.

When Jesus gave Peter the responsibility of leading his Church, he again used shepherd imagery. He told Peter, "Feed my lambs. . . Tend my sheep. . . Feed my sheep" (John 21:15-17).

Knowing about shepherds sheds light on the image of Jesus as shepherd. The shepherd uses a staff



with a hook on the end to guide the sheep and pull back the stray. Today Jesus guides his flock through bishops, who are known as *pastors*, the Latin for shepherds. Bishops carry staffs called crosiers. The shepherd has a rod to fend off wild animals that might harm the flock. Jesus saved us from evil.

Jesus restores our souls. Shepherds feed their flocks. Jesus feeds us with the excellent bread of the Eucharist and brings us to living waters: baptism and the Holy Spirit.

The image of shepherds is that they are kind, loving, patient, strong, and self-sacrificing. They are a good image for Jesus. And sheep, who can be rather stupid and foolish creatures, are a good symbol for us!

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want!

After School Plans

If the after-school arrangements are going to change for your child and you do not want them to take the bus home after school, please ensure that you write a note in your child's agenda or call the school. If no note is written in the agenda or a parent has not called the school, we will send the child on the bus as is the usual arrangement. Many times, a child will tell us that they are not supposed to take the bus home because they are getting picked up, and then we cannot get hold of parents and the bus ends up leaving very late as a result while we are trying to reach parents. This ends up making every student on that route late getting home and worrying many parents.

In addition, students will not be allowed to use the office phone to arrange play dates for after school. They must make these plans with their parents beforehand.

Therefore, if there is no note or phone call, the child will be placed on the bus. The office will not be phoning parents after school to confirm if a student states that there is a change in after-school plans.

Emergency Communications

In the Edmonton Catholic School Division, the safety of our students is always our first priority and students are well supervised when they are on school property. When situations occur that warrant emergency procedures to ensure the safety of all students, we will provide parents with accurate and up to date information. One way to keep parents informed about an emergency and the safety procedures that have been put into place is by posting the information on the school website. Information will be posted and updated as required when a school is experiencing an emergency. We also need to keep phone lines available at the school during an emergency, so we ask that you do not call the school. This will enable the staff at the school to keep in touch with emergency providers and Division personnel. Thank you for your support and help in ensuring our students remain safe.

Emergency Procedures

In the event of a potentially dangerous situation, we have a Crisis Management Plan in place. Depending on the type of potential emergency, there are three possible responses. On Alert is called when it is important that hallways are clear for a medical emergency or there is an external threat. Students do not leave the building but all classroom and school activities continue as usual. Lockdown is called when there is an immediate threat to the occupants of the building. Evacuation



would occur if there is a fire or other danger to safety within the building. If students would need to be outside the building for a length of time, they would proceed to S. Bruce Smith School. We practice our procedures for Lockdown and Evacuation through the school year so the students are well prepared in the event of an emergency.

Halloween Activities at Good Shepherd

The afternoon of October 31 will be full of Halloween fun for students at Good Shepherd Catholic School. While we want to provide the fun and enjoyment that Halloween offers, we ask that students/parents please follow the guidelines below.

- Cultural appropriation should not be reflected in costumes.
- Costumes should be simple and comfortable (students should be able to comfortably participate in all learning engagements).
- Because classroom space is limited, especially during our classroom-to-classroom parade, please avoid inflatable or awkwardly large costumes. Once a time for our costume parade has been established, it will be communicated to parents/guardians.
- Costumes must allow for handwashing and hand sanitizing; therefore, no hand coverings.
- Students are not to bring costume accessories that are weapons to school.
- The only snacks that will be shared are healthy snacks that the teacher has organized with parents.
 Please do not send any food with your child unless the arrangement has been made with the homeroom teacher.
- If it is easier for your child and family, students can dress in orange and black or in a Halloween shirt.

Thank you, in advance, for your cooperation in following these guidelines. We are confident that our students will have an enjoyable time celebrating Halloween at school on October 31. Happy Halloween!

World Teachers' Day ~ October 5

Teachers are some of the most important members of any country's society. According to UNESCO, teachers help to educate global citizens, and so they are global leaders. Thus, teachers have earned an international day called World Teachers Day during which their efforts are recognized and applauded, and during which they can work together to further educate themselves and others.

Teachers have what is most certainly one of the most difficult professions of any available. On any given day, a teacher is expected not only to educate at least twenty – more often 25-35, and even more in developing countries – children in one classroom, but also do it with limited resources.



Teachers often face the challenge of educating average, gifted, and special needs students in the same classroom using versions of pre-approved methods. Some of their students may not speak the language most common to their country. Others may come from fractured or abusive homes. The increase in high-stakes testing around the world also means teachers face even more pressure than is already inherent in their jobs, to get the children in their care through classes and on to the next course or grade.

In order to raise awareness of these and other issues, and to show appreciation to teachers, we have World Teachers Day. This day was first created by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Foundation (UNESCO) in 1966 and remains a holiday today, celebrated every year on October 5th.

This is a wonderful time for us to pause and be thankful that we have a sustainable, high quality educational system and to thank our teachers for living out their vocation to Catholic education. Their commitment to our children is so important to building their futures, and to building a strong society.

Terry Fox Run

Terry Fox often reminded us that it would be young people who would carry on his dream of working toward a world without cancer. Each year, millions of students across Canada participate in the Terry Fox School Run, raising vital funds for

cancer research. It has become one of the largest fundraising events in Canadian history and a powerful display of unity and hope.

Student Water Bottles

Orange Shirt Day

This year, September 30 marked the third annual National Day for Truth and Reconciliation — an annual commemoration honouring the children who died while attending residential schools and the survivors, families and communities still affected by the legacy of the residential school system. September 30 was chosen as the date to commemorate what occurred because if falls during the time of year when Indigenous children were taken away from their homes and brought to residential schools.

Since September 30 was a holiday, all Catholic schools in the Division commemorated Orange Shirt/Truth and Reconciliation Day on Monday, September 29. It was so wonderful to walk into each classroom and see a sea of orange fill almost every little seat. During this time period, classes participated in events to commemorate Truth and Reconciliation Week and Orange Shirt Day.

A Bite of Health

As an APPLE school, we strive to build a healthy school community focusing on improving students' mental health, physical activity, and eating habits for life.

Say What?

This month, students are learning the importance of using respectful language when discussing health through a monthly campaign called *Say What?* Here is a summary of the learnings.

Why use inclusive language?

Everyone's mental, physical, and nutritional health needs are different, and we need to be respectful with how we talk to them about their health. Using rude or hurtful words can impact how others feel about their health and themselves, but we can combat that by using positive language. Using positive language about health can create a safe environment for students to practice their health habits.



Why inclusive language matters.

1 in 3 Canadian youth are bullied. Bullying can lead to depression, anxiousness, irritability and other serious consequences. But practising inclusive language when it comes to health helps mitigate the use of harmful phrases and comments which may harm children.

How you can practice this at home	Examples
Comment on someone's process (how they played), rather than the outcome (whether they won or lost).	"Your catching skills are really improving, that's great!"
Use positive language when you are talking about your own body. This sets a positive example for your children.	"Not very many people have red hair like I do. That's one thing that makes me feel special."
Describe foods by the texture, colour, flavour or nutrients rather than using labels like "healthy" and "unhealthy" or "good" and "bad."	"Wow, all the vegetables in this pasta make it so colourful, it's like a rainbow!" "Apples have lots of fibre which help digest our food."
Share strategies you use when you feel down. This will help your child develop healthy strategies themselves.	"I like to talk to my friends when I am sad. They always listen to me."


